This starts with providing them the proper nutrition, vaccinations, and parasite protection, as well as providing them with plenty of mental and physical stimulation to help establish a strong bond between you and your pet.

Vaccinations

It's essential to vaccinate your puppy at the correct times to allow the greatest protection from a variety of serious and potentially fatal diseases, including canine parvovirus, canine distemper virus, infectious canine hepatitis, and infectious canine tracheobronchitis (kennel cough). In some regions, it's also recommended to vaccinate against Leptospirosis (please check with your vet).

It's important to keep up with the recommended vaccination schedule for puppies as they grow to provide your pup with the best disease protection.



If you're not sure when your puppy is due for their next vaccination, talk to our team to make sure your puppy is up to date.

Typical puppy vaccination schedule*:



First vaccination between 6-8 weeks old



Second vaccination between 10-12 weeks old



Third booster between 14-16 weeks old

* Check with your vet for the recommended vaccination schedule for your puppy



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Talk to your vet about deworming for your puppy.

Intestinal worms

Another parasite you need to protect your new pup from are intestinal worms. Intestinal worms live in the intestines and feed off the nutrients that the puppy consumes. If left untreated, they can cause a wide range of health problems, from malnutrition to anaemia and even death. The most common way puppies become infected is by ingesting the eggs of the parasites, which can be found in contaminated soil, faeces, and other sources. To protect your puppy from these parasites, regular deworming treatments should be provided.

You should deworm your puppy regularly:

- every 2 weeks until 12 weeks of age
- then once a month until 6 months of age,
- And every 3-6 months for life (more often when they're around young children)

Fleas

Fleas commonly cause itching, skin disease and allergic reactions in pups. What's more, they can be challenging to diagnose, as a puppy with flea allergy dermatitis may never actually be seen with fleas! That's why flea treatments should be given every month of the year to prevent and control flea infestations effectively.

Dental health



Good dental health is essential for pets, just like it is for humans! Puppies can be prone to dental health problems, so it's good to start caring for their teeth from a young age. Proper dental care can help prevent the build-up of plaque and tartar, which can lead to gum disease and tooth decay, not to mention smelly breath. Regular brushing and professional dental cleanings can help remove any built-up debris and help keep your pup's teeth and gums healthy as they get older.

Microchipping

Microchipping your puppy helps ensure they are easily identified and is a requirement for all dogs to be registered in New Zealand for the first time (excluding working farm dogs). A tiny chip is placed under the skin of the neck, between your puppy's shoulder blades. If your puppy is found and taken to a vet or animal shelter, staff will use a scanner to retrieve the unique identifying code on your puppy's microchip, which is stored in nationwide registry databases. Therefore, it's important to keep these details up to date. If you're unsure of your puppy's microchip status, we can use our clinic scanner to check this.

Weight & Nutrition

Weight

Maintaining a healthy weight for your puppy is extremely important for their overall health and well-being. Keeping your puppy at their

ideal weight helps to keep their bones, joints, and muscles strong and healthy. In addition, keeping your puppy at their ideal weight can help reduce the risk of serious health conditions such as diabetes, heart disease, and types of cancer.

Monitor your puppy's weight regularly and work with your veterinary healthcare team to make adjustments to ensure they stay at their ideal weight. By doing so, you can help your puppy stay healthy and happy.

Nutrition

Proper nutrition is another part of helping your puppy get the best start in life. Puppies need a balanced diet that includes all the essential nutrients for and development. Proper nutrition is vital

Small breed puppies usually reach their adult bodyweight at 10 months of age, where giant breeds can grow for up to two years!



Desexing

Desexing your puppy doesn't just prevent them from having unwanted litters; it also reduces the risk of certain diseases and cancers, such as prostate and mammary gland tumours and pyometra (an infection of the uterus). Additionally, desexing can help to reduce the urge to roam, which can result in accidents and injuries, and reduce urine marking and aggressive behaviours.



Desexing is recommended between 6 and 12 months of age. Talk to your veterinarian about when they recommend your dog should be desexed.
